Welcome from Director Gary Selby



The Center for Faith and Learning seeks to unite what many in the academy would separate: the life of faith and the life of the mind. While we are fully aware that there is no single model for what constitutes the successful integration of faith and learning in our classrooms, nor is there only one answer for how our faith might inform our scholarship, the Center is committed to the proposition that the separation between our various disciplines and our faith is neither intellectually sustainable nor personally satisfying.

Since its founding, the Center has developed several programs to support faculty and students in all five schools of the University as they seek

to engage in cutting edge, original scholarship and classroom teaching within a framework of Christian beliefs and values. These programs include new faculty retreats, faculty development seminars, promoting faculty scholarship, and hosting national conferences. The purpose of these endeavors is to sustain a conversation about how religious insights bear on the work that we do as scholars, administrators, and students, knowing full well that absent this constant nourishment the conversation will die and we will have failed to live up to the mission of our university.

The 2015-2016 academic year, which marked the 17th year of the Center's activity, represents a continuation of this original vision, enhanced and enlargened by the new projects and programs that the Center has taken on since its founding. We hope that this report provides an overview of the Center's activity and inspires those who are interested to join us in our pursuit of the integration of faith and learning.

The Center's 2015-2016 Goals

- To provide support for faculty as they seek to engage in cutting-edge, original scholarship and classroom teaching within a framework of Christian values and beliefs.

AND HOW DOES THAT CONNECT?

Faculty and staff were provided resources to **EXPLORE** the intersection of Christian faith and academic learning through opportunitues such as the SOUL SABBATHS and the UNPLUGGED RETREAT.

Prior to the start of the spring semester, student ministry leaders from across all departments at Pepperdine were invited to a weekend of soul care designed to help these students rest in prayer and worship in preparation for Spring. 100% of students left behind their phones, emails, and all technology and spent 3 days exploring who God is and the nature of His calling on each of their ministries, guided by various staff members and guest speaker Chris Webb.

Students lock their phones into a suitcase for the entire weekend in order to eliminate distractions.

- Hosted in Santa Barbara on the weekend prior to spring semester
- FREE for all participants!
- 123 participants, including: 71 undergraduate student ministry leaders, 17 nominated first-year students, 10 grad students, and 25 staff members
- Over a dozen departments & organizations represented, including: UCC Campus Ministry, Christian Legal Society, Christianity & Public Policy, Religion Division, Great Books Colloquium, International Programs, Volunteer Center, University Ministries, RelationshipIQ, Spiritual Life Advisors, and Student-Led Ministries
- Featuring main speaker Chris Webb, an Anglican Benedictine priest and author of "Fire of the Word," teaching on encountering Scripture in a fresh way
- Schedule included small group time, spiritual practices, hiking, worship, communion, and a time of solitude

Students were given ample time to explore and experience God through individual quiet time, nature, discussions over coffee, and even exercise.

DID IT WORK?

- On a scale of 1 to 5, students self-reported an average increase of 0.5/5 in "feeling at peace and centered."
- Almost half the students expressed appreciation for the quiet "unplugged" experience in their comments.
- Almost half took away from the experience training on how to "rest without distraction" and "new ways to engage with Scripture."

SPEND A FEW QUIET HOURS WITH GOD AT SERRA RETREAT

DID IT WORK?

- Students reported an increase in "feeling connected with peers, class, and Pepperdine" from an average score of 3.2/5 before the retreat to 4.5/5.0 after the retreat.
- Prior to the retreat, 74.5% of students repoted investing in the same church 2-4 times per month. After the retreat, 98% of students reported planning to commit to a single church 2-4 times per month.
- Students described Y2D1 as "planting many seeds... which will continue to grow," a "refreshing and encouraging way to start the year," and "a gift of fellowship."

- Students reported learning how to "see more clearly God working" and "hear diverse perspectives from others."

All student ministry leaders and staff were eligible for free shuttles to the Serra Retreat Center (located 10 minutes from campus) for 2 hours of soul care, rest, and "unplugging" from technology. Three sessions were offered each semester; an average of 20 students and staff attended each session.

Why all the quiet? In partnership with other spiritual life departments on campus, the Center has been walking alongside students to help them explore the lessons that can be learned by listening for God in the quiet moments. We've learned from the burnout and the "I'm always busy!" nature of students' lives, and have provided a safe space for them to be filled up so that they can serve from a place of overflowing.

Christian Leaderhip Formation Sessions

CHARACTER is a newly developed "training" program for first year students, geared towards helping students discover and live into their identity as sons and daughters of Christ. The program is designed to address questions of "who we are," rather than "what we do," during this crucial stage of leadership formation in students' lives. At the same time, students will be exposed to the numerous

spiritual life opportunities on Pepperdine campus, and encouraged to discern their individual calling towards a particular ministry and articulate how that fits into the greater picture of God's mission on earth. The program kicked off in Spring 2016 with a pilot group of 12 students meeting 8 times total.

ASSESSMENT

Student Evaluations

- All sessions were rated 4/5 or better, with Session 5 scoring the highest (M = 4.818). 59.26% of all ratings were 5/5.
- When asked to describe what the program achieved, students reported "finding [their] identities" and "developing [their] relationship[s] with God."

Presenter Evaluations

- On average, presenters felt like their sessions were effective (M = 4.55/5), the students were attentive (M = 5/5), their topic was relevant (4.88/5), and the sessions were worth their time and energy (5/5).
- Presenters praised students for having an "openness to learning" and for being "at ease with each other," including arriving on time!

THE PEPPERDINE VOYAGE: NEW & MID-CAREER FACULTY RETREATS

Faculty and administrators from across all five Pepperdine schools are invited to annual retreats at an International Program location for workshops to



develop in their roles as Christian teachers and scholars. Participants are encouraged to shape their vocational identity, partner with the Pepperdine community, and resonate with the Christian mission. The mid-career retreat is an opportunity for tenured faculty who did not participate in the new faculty retreat.

DID IT WORK?

Mid-Career Retreat

- Averaged scores out of 5 include: activities (4.6), readings (4.1), degree to which the retreat "refreshed your passion for teaching" (4.4), degree to which the retreat "helped you think more seriously about the relationship between your own Christian faith and your vocation as a teacher/scholar" (4.3), and overall impact (4.6).
- Faculty reported that the readings were "thought-provoking and helpful,"
 "refreshing," and great for discussions. Many wanted more discussion
 time to explore the readings.
- Overall, faculty reported a "renewed sense of community," a "deeper love for our colleagues," and a sense of "feeling valued."

New Faculty Retreat

- Averaged scores out of 5 include: activites (4.8), readings (4.0), degree
 to which the retreat "helped you think more seriously about vocation"
 (4.2), degree to which the retreat "helped you think more seriously about
 the relationship between your own Christian faith and your vocation as a
 teacher/scholar" (4.2), and overall impact (4.7).
- Faculty reported that the readings were "'talked' to each other well," were "thoughfully referenced" during sessions, and impacted how they planned to teach their classes in the future.
- Faculty praised the retreat for being "a gem" that isn't found at any other institution, loved the opportunity to "bond with my colleagues," and wanted more time to discuss in smaller groups.



MINISTRY INTERNSHIPS & SERVICE GRANTS

The Center for Faith and Learning partners with the Religion Division to offer funding for ministry-related internships for Seaver College students desiring to pursue a calling in religion and ministry. This program allows students to test their vocational wings by participating in a ministry of the church under the direct supervision of a professional who works full-time in a church-based ministry. Similarly, the service and social action grants, which are offered in partnership with the Inter-Club Council (Student Activities), provide funding for student-led initiatives and projects that address and/or seek to alleviate poverty and hunger, to promote peace and justice, and to serve the community in a variety of ways.

Major Events
