That the quality of student life is a valid concern of the University


That truth, having nothing to fear from investigation, should be pursued relentlessly in every discipline

SHALOM

It is a vision of human flourishing. Shalom means humans living in right relationships with God, fellow humans, nature and self—and in taking delight in such relationships Shalom involves finding meaning in our experiences and celebrating the actualizing of creation's potentials. Shalom involves recognizing ourselves as humans in terms of that place where God's goodness finds its answer in our gratitude. Shalom is an ethical community where all the members have a full and secure place in the community. As such, it embraces a "non-abandonment" of the creation while asking us to take a "redemptive view point."

ADOPTING A HOLY DISSATISFACTION

Shalom as a command asks us to respond—now—to the cries and tears of human suffering: the pangs of the hungry, the demoralizing effect of no jobs despite long searches, the anguish of those abandoned to refugee camps for generations, the squalor of inner cities, the pollution of modern industrial society, the fear and danger facing those not accepted by the community, the places of war around the globe, inhumane working conditions, the domination by the rich of the poor, the list can be long.

A CALL TO ACTION

Shalom as a command is a call for us to struggle to bring about human flourishing in our community, our society, our globe, precisely because so much of humanity cries out, suffers, is wounded. The messianic light pulls us forward to action, in the world, to help bring about human flourishing, suggesting that we cannot remain indifferent to the plight of those around us. To be a Christian is to be under a certain uprising from a messianic pull, where we see the tears of God behind the wounds of the world, where we meet a wounded God behind the injustices that exist around the globe. Shalom is a call to non-indifference, here, now—it cannot wait.

ON AUTHENTICITY

Have you ever stopped to marvel at how amazingly unique you are? I don't mean in an inflated sense, as in our delusions of grandeur, but in the mere odds of it all. From the color of your eyes, to the shape of your nose, from the way you walk to what you dream about, you are a complex combination of features that exists nowhere else in time and space than where you are. No one ever has been or ever will be the you that you are. That is remarkable.

More importantly, have you ever stopped to wonder why? Is God just really bad at creating humans, unable to create the perfect specimen but resigned to keep trying? Hardly. In simply being our true selves, doing nothing more than becoming the unique person that God created us to be, we give glory to God and follow our own particular path of holiness. That's it! We are not to imitate the lives of the saints or do what others define for us; our path to holiness is not made by scrupulously following that path of a holy person who has gone before us. What is asked of me may not be asked of you. What you are capable of may not be what I am capable of. Each and every one of us has been created differently, for God's own glory, and we each have our own path to follow.

I love Pope Francis's words in this regard he writes, "We should not grow discouraged before examples of holiness that appear unattainable. There are some testimonies that may prove helpful and inspiring, but that we are not meant to copy, for that could even lead us astray from the one specific path that the Lord has in mind for us."
