A class syllabus including any advance reading and/or writing assignments for intensive classes will be emailed to students 3-4 weeks prior to the start of class. Please note that it is each student's responsibility to review the syllabus well before the class begins and complete any advance assignments. Students who show up the first day unprepared risk being dropped from the class.

If a student intends to miss one or more classes for religious observance in an intensive course (i.e., one that runs for a shorter period than a regular semester term), he or she must notify the Academic Dean prior to registering for that intensive course to determine whether such absences would fundamentally alter the nature of the intensive course.

RESCHEDULING EXAMS

While most Straus classes will require a final paper instead of a final exam, it is important for everyone to be aware of the exam rescheduling policy in the event you enroll in one or more classes with a final exam. Students may not petition to reschedule a final exam unless two final exams are to be taken on the same day. Therefore, it is important for you to pay attention to the final exam schedule when you are selecting your courses. Petitions to change one of two exams scheduled for the same day must be filed by the seventh week of classes. NEW ADJUNCT FACULTY

Jonathan Derby - In 2004 Jonathan graduated from Pepperdine Caruso School of Law with a Juris Doctor (JD) degree. He worked 14 years with organizations in India that help the most vulnerable access justice. In 2005, he joined International Justice Mission in Mumbai, which combats sex trafficking and forced prostitution. He became Field Office Director in 2008 and led a team of 40 staff. In April 2012, Jonathan moved to Delhi and started Counsel to Secure Justice (CSJ), an organization that provides legal support and restorative care to children who experience sexual harm. Over the next six years, CSJ supported more than 225 clients during their criminal proceedings. As he and the team worked closely with Delhi's justice system, Jonathan saw restorative justice's transcending potential to repair brokenness and harm caused by crime. Recently, Jonathan joined Dan Van Ness, Karen Heetderks Strong and Lynette Parker to revise the important restorative justice textbook, Restoring Justice. Currently, he consults with Prison Fellowship International to educate and build capacity among global partners on restorative justice concepts and best practices.

Salim Munayer is the founding director of Musalaha, a faith-based organization that facilitates reconciliation mainly between Israelis and Palestinians from diverse ethnic and religious backgrounds based on biblical principles. As a Palestinian Israeli Christian, Dr Munayer has spent his life navigating contexts of conflict including within his own identity. He is adjunct professor at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem and previously served as Academic Dean at Bethlehem Bible College, Palestine. Dr Munayer holds a PhD from Oxford Centre for Mission Studies, UK.

Chidinma Ume serves as the Deputy Director of Policy at the Center for Court Innovation and is primarily responsible for providing national technical assistance in the areas of jail reduction, criminal justice debt reform, and prosecutorial perspectives. Chidinma works with counties and states around the U.S. and in Nigeria to support them in designing and implementing reforms that promote fairness, evidence-informed practices, and human-centered approaches.

Prior to joining the Center, Chidinma served as Executive Director for Justice Operations at the New York City Mayor's Office of Criminal Justice where she worked with justice system actors to make New York City's system safer and fairer. Chidinma's work spanned a broad range of projects, including reform to reduce case delays, enhance public defense, and improve mental competency examinations for detained individuals. As chief policy architect in these areas, she led several Mayoral initiatives that have contributed to a more than 30% reduction in the Rikers Island jail population. Most notably, Chidinma led Mayor Bill de Blasio's Justice Reboot Initiative, to reduce unnecessary incarceration after the tragic death of Kalief Browder. Before joining the Mayor's Office, Chidinma was a prosecutor at the Manhattan District Attorney's Office, where she handled felony and misdemeanor cases involving violent and non-violent crimes, and intimate partner violence. Chidinma worked closely with survivors of crime and the Community Affairs Unit to support the office's efforts to engage communities affected by harm.

Chidinma received her B.A. from the University of California, Berkeley and her law degree from Georgetown University Law Center, where she also defended indigent individuals in D.C. Superior Court and before the US Parole Commission. Chidinma is a native of Los Angeles, where she currently resides. In her down time, she enjoys spending quality time with her family, serving her community in Los Angeles and abroad, and long-distance running.
